Statement of Purpose of the Sub-Branch

Thankfully it looks as though we have been successful in that regard, although there is no doubt that this period has taken a heavy toll, with few families in the area untouched in some way or another.

We have been blessed by the performance of our staff, who have chipped in to assist us to try to fill the employment void we, like everyone else in our industry, is currently experiencing. I take this opportunity to officially thank them, one and all, for the dedication they have shown us over a rather extended period, and hope that in the near future we will be able to employ more staff and make life a little easier on all fronts. Their unselfish efforts over this period have been quiet outstanding.

I must also take this opportunity to thank our General Manager, Jess Feather, who has just left us. Jess took over almost four and a half years ago, when we were in a very precarious position on many fronts. He leaves us today, in one of the strongest positions, on almost all fronts, we have ever experienced. I thank him for a marvellous effort, and know that his experience and dedication will carry him a long way in whatever future role he attempts.

As President I have been blessed by the Sub Branch Committee members, some of whom have been with me for more years than I care to remember, or when you get to my age, can remember. Every year we see a couple retire, and this year is no different. We again lose two stalwarts, Barrie Goldsbury, a past President and life member of our RSL, and Mike Foenander who's experience and good commonsense will be exceptionally hard to replace. I thank both gentlemen for their invaluable efforts over the years, and wish them a long and fruitful leisure time going forward. It was also my pleasant duty to award two life memberships this year, the recipients, Barrie Goldsbury and Peter Paul have each made a huge contribution to us and the RSL in general over many years, and it was very pleasing to be able to recognise their wonderful service to our RSL and the community in general.

Our succession planning portfolio manager, Malcolm Percy, informs me that our two successful candidates filling the two vacant positions on the Sub Branch Committee, are fully qualified to join our illustrious group, and I welcome them both onto the 2023 Committee. I know Malcolm is always on the lookout for likely candidates, so if you are at all interested, or need further information on any form of volunteering to assist our RSL in any way whatsoever, please let Malcom or Andrew Tolley know, I am sure they will go out of their way to assist.

The year going forward will be challenging, we have ANZAC Day in a few days, the complete refurbishment of our kitchen starting on July 14th, and a subdivision commencing in the near future next door, it should be a very busy and interesting twelve months going forward.

As of the date of this writing we are still advertising for a new general manager, however I take this opportunity to thank our senior administration team, who have taken on added responsibility to ensure our RSL continues to function at its normal high level, a great effort all round from a very dedicated team, a really great effort which is really appreciated.

Dear Members

With pleasure I present the General Managers Report to the members of the Phillip Island RSL 2022 continued along the lines of 2021, disruptions with staff shortages throughout the club had an impact on patron levels and serviceability. With reduced days of trade and hours of operation for the majority of the year. We finally achieved a return to normal operating hours late in the year with the support from our dedicated staff.

The Club traded 5 days per week for the majority of the year which resulted in a decrease in our total revenue. On a positive note, Bar/Food sales were up by + 14% and gaming up by + 64% from the previous year, we also need to note, the significant government grants and job keeper contributions added to our total revenue in 2021 which were not replicated in 2022. Costs increased across all of our suppliers ranging from 5 to 20% in some cases. Our surplus for the year was down to \$1,169,000.00, a minus -6.5% from 2021.

The Introduction of My RSL rewards moved our social members to the PIRSL, while Service and Affiliate Members remained part of both the RSL network and My RSL rewards. Moving forward My RSL rewards will result in more direct Members Rewards for PIRSL members.

The also Club moved away from its previous long-term gaming agreement with TGS and now is owner operator of our gaming machines, this saw a significant reduction in the daily gaming costs. This with the introduction of TITO (ticket in ticket out) did see an increase in our expenses, but the benefits of managing our gaming room can already be seen in the trading figures. We have been busy organizing a full kitchen renovation, tenders close in late April with works due to be completed in July/August 2023, this will enable greater flexibility in menu design, reduce operational costs and make a safer work environment in the department.

Along with the Kitchen renovation we have been planning a major redevelopment of the Bistro and back of house areas. This proposal will expand the bistro, incorporating a new alfresco area, enlarge the children's playroom to further enhance the range of dining and socializing options for members. The Proposed works will be completed in 2024.

Overall 2022 was the year of recovery from Covid and we look forward to 2023 without interruptions.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Committee and our Staff for their ongoing support throughout 2022 and look forward to a positive 2023.

We managed an outing to the Tooradin Sports Club for lunch and celebrated a Christmas lunch on 15th December. We have finally gone back to Monday for Day Club and are grateful to the RSL for their help and the staff for their continued support.

Poppy Rug

We had an enormous amount of people ask about the Poppy Rug on Remembrance Day here is a little back story about the 5000 Poppies - Community Textile Art Project

When my sister-in-law, Lynn Berry and I began our project in 2013 little did we know what we had taken on. It has been an honour and privilege for us to collect over 250,000 handmade poppies sent from around the globe to create this tribute of respect and remembrance for those who serve their countries in wartime.

We have always seen the project as a fibre art installation, firstly as a personal tribute to our fathers and then as a community art project. The ability for anyone to contribute their poppy has made this very accessible for the community to pay respect in a personal way.

We have had many poppies contributed from Phillip Island and when we needed more on stems for the design planned for London a group of dedicated volunteers from the Phillip Island Patch workers and the ladies from the RSL Day club enthusiastically took on the task of making 1,000 of them.

Lynn and I feel proud to have been able to take it to the world stage, in conjunction with Phillip Johnson, by displaying it in the grounds of the Chelsea Hospital in London during the renowned Chelsea Flower show in May. It is a powerful and emotional display and we have shed many tears when reading the dedications submitted with contributors' poppies.

We have just returned from the Western Front in Fromelles, France where we had a smaller but extremely poignant display of the stemmed poppies at Cobbers Memorial Park between Pheasant Wood Cemetery and VC Corner to mark the 100-year anniversary of the battle where the 5th Australian Division suffered 5,533 casualties.

My personal experience of the project has been extremely rewarding. I have worked with a my extremely talented sister-in-law, Lynn Berry who I have nicknamed Super Woman, and a wonderful dedicated group of volunteers without whom we could not have pulled this massive community art project together; many friendships have been formed



and lots of local community groups cemented by having this project to focus on.

The Chelsea Pensioners, whose backyard we took over to do our installation in London, were incredibly welcoming and I loved hearing the stories they told of their lives at the Chelsea Hospital. It still brings a tear to my eye when I remember their piper coming down the red carpet in the centre of our display playing Waltzing Matilda as their thanks to us for what we were doing.

I am also still feeling overwhelmed by the public response to the display in London and without the photos to prove it I would not believe I had the privilege to meet so many VIPs on the opening day including people such as Rupert Murdoch and Jerry Hall, Demi Moore, Wilbur Smith, a couple of the Bond Girls, Theresa May (then Home Secretary and now Prime Minister of Britain) and of course many members of the Royal Family including Princess Anne, Prince Philip, Prince Harry, Prince William and his beautiful wife Kate Middleton. The absolute pinnacle though was the incredible honour of meeting Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II.

Memorabilia

Chris Thompson and Michael Crumphave had a busy year with Memorabilia.

The outdoor displays will have signs next to each one asking the public not to climb on them. The dark green 25 Pounder will be removed soon to undergo a strip down for restoration and repaint in the correct colour.

The Bofors gun will also be removed for a clean and

repaint as well. The RSL now has an Owen Gun that will go on display soon, the museum Light Horsemen is having a makeover because he is wearing kit from multiple generations, so he will over time be transferred into a WW1 Light Horsemen, changing most of his uniform.

We will continue to improve our indoor and outdoor displays.





DVA Pensions Advocacy


The PIRSL VCS work to arrange face-to-face meetings between our Service members & DVA Pensions Advocate Lawrence Buck on a monthly basis.

The volunteers have a fun time and the students give a big Thank You to the Volunteers.


